It is estimated that 1 in 8 children in the United States (8.7 million) live with at least one parent who abuses alcohol or other drugs.¹ Parents with substance abuse problems are less likely to effectively function in a parental role.

The Effects of Parental Substance Abuse on Children

Of the 290 cases, 100 (34%) involved concerns about parental substance misuse. The families involving substance misuse were more vulnerable on a variety of measures: the children were younger, the parents had more individual problems and the families lived in more difficult social situations.

As substance use and SUDs among parents often occur in households that face other challenges (e.g., mental illness, poverty, domestic violence), the recovery process may need to extend beyond substance use treatment to produce the changes in a family that are necessary to ensure a healthy family environment for a child. 12

According to the American Society of Addiction Medicine, 40 to 60 percent of domestic violence incidents co-occur with substance abuse.³ Substance abuse and child abuse, sexual abuse, and neglect are also common within families with a history of addiction, and many children suffer from symptoms of PTSD as a result of the trauma.

Living in a household where a parent or carer misuses substances doesn't mean a child will experience abuse but it can be a risk. Substance misuse can have negative effects on children at different stages in their lives. In later years, substance misuse can put children at risk of: physical and emotional abuse or neglect
