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Trees Of The Eastern

Northern red oak grows all over the eastern United States with the exception of the southern coastal plain. Northern red oak (Quercus rubra), also known as common red oak, eastern red oak, mountain red oak, and gray oak, is widespread in the East and grows on a variety of soils and topography, often forming pure stands. Moderate- to fast-growing, this tree is one of the more important lumber species of red oak and is an easily transplanted, popular shade tree with good form and dense foliage.

The only soft pine of eastern forests is the eastern white pine (Pinus strobus). All other species fall into the hard pine group. EASTERN WHITE PINE (Pinus strobus) needles are soft bluish-green, flexible, 3-5 inches long, in bundles of 5, with 3-5 fine white lines (of stomata) on two surfaces of each needle. Needles remain on the tree for two years.

Eastern White Pine Eastern White Pines (Pinus strobus) are native to North America and found from Minnesota south to Arkansas and east. This is the state tree of both Maine and Michigan. Considered the tallest native pine in the east, modern day trees are dwarfed by other trees in the genus, such as the Ponderosa and sugar pine.

The decline in wolf trees in the eastern forest corresponds with the decline in large, old trees globally. It takes a long time to grow a tree with features wildlife can use. On a human timescale, they are, essentially, a finite resource. In the eastern forest, wolf trees survive in a matrix of young trees that rarely surpass 100 years.

The Last of the Giants - American Forests

The deciduous trees that make these forests famous include oaks, maples, beech, birches, and hickories. While evergreen conifers, such as spruce and firs, do live in the eastern forest, they are not as common or dominant as the deciduous trees except under particular types of local conditions.
